Regreening Central Tanzania

Justdiggit Update

Dear Philip Friedel,

To start this progress report, I would like to take the opportunity to thank you again for supporting Justdiggit and our program in Tanzania. With this report, I would like to give you a general update about Justdiggit, our regreening program in Singida and the impact that has been realised so far – partly thanks to your donation!

Besides the regreening program in Tanzania, we are also working hard to restore degraded rangelands in the south of Kenya. In the Chyulu hills, we are digging tens of thousands of soil bunds (or as we like to call them - earth smiles) to restore hundreds of hectares of bare land that was once covered by grasses. By bringing these grasses back, we aim to restore the resilience of the ecosystem, providing a better environment for both wildlife and local communities.

A few hundred kilometers west, we are restoring two large valleys that are a valuable source of grazing land for local communities, together with our new partner SORALO. Here, we are implementing several rainwater harvesting and revegetation interventions.

Lastly, we are happy to share that are relatively young Regional Office East-Africa in Nairobi is growing fast. From this office, which opened mid 2021, we are be able to manage our projects in East Africa even better, as we will be closer to our implementing partners and project locations. Not only can we better finetune the daily project management from here, we will also focus on our African regreening and awareness campaigns and increase our monitoring and evaluation efforts.

Progress Update

With your support, we have been able to start our regreening program in two different village clusters, with a total of 6 villages.

The first 3 villages that are supported by InTime started in May last 2021. A lot happened since then. Champion farmers have been trained and they started the regreening movement in their villages. We have organised the movie roadshow in these villages, promoted the SMS service, our champion farmers have been engaged in coaching and monitoring activities and the village leaders have been putting an effort into enacting village bylaws that protect and favour FMNR trees. So far, over 33,600 trees have been regenerated by over 860 activated households and institutions!



Progress Update

In the remaining three villages, the program is starting up as we speak. Our Tanzanian implementing partner, LEAD Foundation, is selecting potential villages to scale up the program to. This is done in collaboration with local and regional governmental stakeholders, to make sure we focus on the most degraded areas and that the program is supported by all necessary stakeholders.

The next step will be to select champion farmers in these villages. This will be done based on several aspects, such as their social position within the village and their current agricultural practices. After that, they will be thoroughly trained and the regreening starts! We will explain more about the activities that will be carried out in the coming months in the next progress report.
